
From Sharon Mihalyak:



BUILDING BETTER BEADS

form & finish in polymer clay

B is for BETTER: Make 2021 Better with Building Better Beads

From the most intricate cane work to the simple sweep of a Skinner Blend, from mokume to mica shift and more, **polymer clay can draw us in in so many ways** with its colors, patterns, and textures.

But all too often, a closer look can reveal something compromising: a crack, a bubble, a fingerprint, an unsealed seam, an unfinished edge, a neglected backside... and why? Is it a lack of skill? A lack of will? A lack pf planning?

It's easy to want to make something beautiful, and there's no shortage of lessons for learning how to turn a few blocks of clay into a decorative patterned veneer. But sometimes it's not so easy to honour that veneer with the presentation it deserves as a finished piece. I believe that's because **the fundamental basics of technique in form and finish have been overlooked and under taught**.

In my next online course, I hope to change that.

FINISHING RIGHT FROM THE START

With a material that lends itself so well to 'play,' there's a lot about these fundamental techniques that can feel like 'work.' More thorough mixing, more careful cutting, longer leaching, slower baking, endless sanding... The non-decorative stuff can take longer than anything else, and why bother finishing the back of the brooch if no one's going to see it anyway, right?

It's true that seeing something through can feel like a lot of work. But a beautifully crafted object is worth the effort. Good craftsmanship can make all the difference... the difference between whether or not you get into that next-level

craft show or gallery, or the difference between feeling the need to point out the flaws in your work instead of standing proudly behind it with the knowledge that you gave it everything you could.

There's a lot of mediocre work out there. Better crafted, better finished work will make your work stand out.

This isn't to suggest that perfection needs to be your goal. As part of the process, **mistakes can be your best teachers**. But there are always ways to make a good thing better, and in doing that, we are always growing, as designers, as builders, and as artists and ambassadors for our medium. **Good work habits make good work**, and there is nothing more rewarding than that.

My next course is about getting from good to better.

Better tools. Better skills. Better habits. Starting things right.

Better planning. Better processes. Better finishing. Right from the start.

In every workshop I teach, even if the focus isn't on finishing, the fundamentals of craftsmanship are part of the teaching, and integral to the learning. But most workshops usually only last a day or a weekend, rarely enough time to cover the content, let alone implement the practice in a mindful way.

With online learning, without the limits of time and space that come with an in-person workshop, curriculum content can **span wider**, **reach farther**, **go deeper**. Instead of everyone (teacher and students) trying to cram everything into a single weekend, in a single space (often crowded), at a single pace (sometimes too slow, sometimes too fast), **my online workshop will last for a full four weeks**. You can come and go as you want or need to, based on your own experience, skill, and learning style. You'll have ample time to complete the workshop project once, or rewind, review, and repeat if you want more practice in a mentored real-time environment. And via our virtual classroom, I'll come to you, so you can work and play and learn in the space you know and love best: your own studio.

With content delivered through video, written lessons, and other internet-accessible resources, you'll have a front row seat for every demo; a place to ask questions, post images, and get feedback (teacher to student, and peer to peer); and 24/7 access to read and review everything as you go, whenever you want, for the duration of the workshop... without ever leaving home. Four weeks instead of two days, in your own studio. What could be better than that?

If you want to learn everything from practical tips and tricks to a whole new way of thinking, idea to object, there's no better workshop offered in our HoCo! School than Building Better Beads. And with so many other workshops and Master Classes waiting for a spot on our curriculum calendar, BBB may not be back for at least another year.


